***The Relation Between Secret Intelligence and Public Evidence
in Terrorism Investigations and Prosecutions***

Prof. Roach will discuss how various new anti-terrorism laws in other countries, enacted after the attacks of 11 September 2001, have changed the relationship between secret intelligence and public evidence, thereby posing challenges for the police, security intelligence agencies, and the courts – a subject relevant to the Danish debate and the new legislation on a “special advocate” system to deal with secret evidence in terrorism cases.

Kent Roach is a professor of law at the University of Toronto Faculty of Law and has published extensively on anti-terrorism law, including *September 11: Consequences for Canada* and *Global Anti-Terrorism Law and Policy* (edited with Victor Ramraj and Michael Hor). Prof. Roach is also active as a lawyer in Canada.
