The purpose of this course is to train PhD students in research-based approaches to strengthen and clarify their writing processes. The goal is not simply to add an addendum to their research training, or to focus solely on the output of a research project, but to use writing skills as an entry point into a more critical approach to the input and output of their projects. Students will learn how to re-engineer their research processes to facilitate clearer thought and ultimately, clearer writing.
